

Connect to fiber optic terminal box

Step 5: Label and Manage Fibers Label each fiber and port clearly to facilitate troubleshooting and future expansion. Use cable ties or tubing to organize fibers and prevent entanglement, ensuring the standard bend radius is maintained.

Step 6: Test the Connections After installation, gently pull on fibers to confirm they are secure. Use a fiber power meter or optical time-domain reflectometer (OTDR) to test signal quality and verify that all connections are stable and free from weak points.
