Safety and Code Compliance The National Electrical Code (NEC) mandates that neutral and ground wires remain separate in subpanels to ensure that fault currents travel only through the grounding system and normal return currents travel through the neutral. Bonding neutral and ground in a subpanel can cause metal parts to become energized during a fault, potentially leading to electric shock and malfunction of protective devices like GFCIs and AFCIs.
