Install or replace junction box covers to fully enclose the wires and prevent accidental contact. If there is insufficient slack or damaged wiring, consider adding a new junction box or replacing the cable segment to maintain proper insulation and code compliance.

Best Practices Regularly inspect distribution boxes for frayed or exposed wires. Avoid makeshift repairs with duct tape or non-electrical materials. Ensure all connections are tight and secure to prevent arcing. Keep combustible materials away from distri...
